LAKE GEORGE LAND CONSERVANCY ANNOUNCES BOARD APPOINTMENTS

(Bolton Landing, NY)—The Lake George Land Conservancy has announced the appointment of Joyce L. Rice to a three-year term on its Board of Directors.

Originally from Ohio, Rice received a degree in business administration from Ramapo College in New Jersey. After a career in banking, commercial real estate, and small business ownership in New York City and New Jersey, Rice and her husband, Don, now reside in Silver Bay, New York, and Sanibel, Florida.

“Community service has always been important to me,” said Rice, “whether in feeding the homeless in New York City, pioneering as a ‘Mom’ Little League coach or helping NYC children in the Fresh Air Fund Program. I look forward to my work with the Lake George Land Conservancy as a significant opportunity to work with other dedicated people in stewardship for Lake George.”

In addition to Rice’s appointment, the Lake George Land Conservancy Board of Directors approved the re-appointment of current members whose terms had expired. The board re-appointed Sandra Nierzwicki-Bauer, PhD, Director of Bolton Landing’s Darrin Freshwater Institute, as Treasurer, and Harvey Schadler, PhD, of Bolton Landing and Niskayuna, New York, as Co-Vice President, each for additional three-year terms. Dean Cook, DDS, of Ticonderoga, was elected to serve as Co-Vice President alongside Schadler. The following individuals were also re-appointed to the Board of Directors for three-year terms: Tim Barnett, John Hubbard, and Charles Mason.

Founded in 1988, the Lake George Land Conservancy works to preserve the world-renowned water quality of Lake George and the rare plants and animals within the lake’s 150,000-acre watershed by permanently protecting natural lands through conservation easement and fee acquisition. To date, more than a thousand concerned individuals have helped the Lake George Land Conservancy and partners protect over 40,000 feet of shoreline and more than 10,000 acres of land.
